Sorry, no free trips to the Great Yorkshire Show this year as we didn't seem to accrue more members as a result. Instead, John Hopkins and Sue Marriot entered the secure portals of Menwith Hill for their Health and Well-being Fair on May 22<sup>nd</sup> to encourage some of the community who work there to come on our walks. Regarding membership, we dropped below 300 to 283 for the first time I can remember. Currently, libraries are sent copies of the walks booklet. As this contains private information, from now on only posters will be made available to them.
